SPECIFIC ISSUES OF INTEREST TO THE CCB:

Chilean Cherries Face MRL Violation in Taiwan

- The Association of Chilean Fruit Exporters (ASOEX) <u>announced</u> (in Spanish) that between November 24 and December 13, 2022, nine shipments of cherries were rejected by the Taiwan Food & Drug Agency (TFDA) for containing residues of Cyantraniliprole at low levels. Taiwan does not have an established Maximum Residue Level (MRL) for the pesticide on cherries.
- ASOEX says that Chilean cherries are now being "fully monitored" as a result. In an ASOEX-provided <u>English translation</u>, the TFDA warns the Chilean industry that if Chile fails to provide a report explaining the detections by February 5, inspections of Chilean cherries would be suspended.
- According to <u>Taiwanese media reports</u>, Taiwan has rejected 8.4 tons of cherries and is currently considering expanding inspections to cover 100 percent of Chilean cherry shipments, up from the current 20-50 percent rate.

Update on Recent Draft Amendments to India's Labeling Standard

- On January 5, India notified the WTO of the Draft Food Safety Standards
 (Labelling & Display) Amendment Regulations, 2022, amending the Food Safety
 and Standards (Labelling & Display) Regulations, 2020 (July 2022 compendium linked).
- On January 6, the Food Safety and Standards Authority of India (FSSAI) issued a
 Direction to re-operationalize the notified draft Food Safety and Standards
 (Labelling & Display) Amendment Regulations, 2022 (as attached to the
 Direction), until the final regulations are promulgated. The draft labeling and
 display regulations had already been operationalized by <u>Direction File No:</u>
 STD/SP-08/A1.2022/N-01-Part (1) on July 1, 2022, and were published for
 comments on December 1, 2022 (BCI Monitor 12-13-22).
- Of note to CCB, the draft amendments clarify which agricultural products, including minimally processed fruit, are exempt from mandatory nutrition labeling, and revise labeling requirements for non-retail containers (*BCI Monitor 12-13-22*).

GENERAL ISSUES OF INTEREST TO THE CCB:

Chinese Recycling Logo Recommended Standard Enters into Force

- On February 1, China's National Standardization Administration's standard <u>GB/T</u> <u>18455-2022 Packaging Recycling Marking</u> (in Chinese) will enter into force (BCI Monitor 8-23-22, 10-11-22).
- The China National Export Commodities Packaging Research Institute <u>provides</u> (in Chinese) guidelines regarding the recommended standard. An English translation is not available.

South Korea Updates Food Packaging Standards Related to Use of Recycled Food Contact Materials

- On December 29, South Korea's Ministry of Food and Drug Safety (MFDS) published <u>MFDS Notice No.</u> <u>2022-97</u> (in Korean), amending Article 2(1) of the Standards and Specifications for utensils, containers and packaging rule.
- According to machine translation, new provisions for recycled food contact materials are established, reflecting legislation recently promulgated in this field (BCI Monitor 8-2-22, 12-20-22).
- The amendment entered into force on December 29, 2022.

South Korea Invites Comments on Amendments to Labeling and Advertising Regulation

- On January 9, South Korea's Ministry of Food and Drug Safety (MFDS) notified the WTO of Ministry of Food and Drug Safety Notice No. 2022 593 (in Korean), inviting comments on several amendments to the Standard for Determining Unfair Labelling and Advertising of Foods.
- Based on machine translation of the summary, the amendments may pertain to advertising of nutritional content.
