General Issues of Interest to the CCB:

USDA Publishes Translation of China's Updated Food Contact Materials Standard

- On September 18, the U.S. Department of Agriculture Foreign Agricultural Service (USDA FAS) published a <u>GAIN report</u> including an English translation of China's draft updated food contact materials (FCM) standard.
- The proposed changes were first announced on August 1 and subsequently notified to the WTO on August 29 (*BCI Monitor 8-5-25, 9-2-25*).
- Once finalized, the standard will replace the General Safety Requirements for Food Contact Materials and Articles (GB 4806.1-2016) and National Food Safety Standard Food Contact Composite Materials and Articles (GB 4806.13-2023).
- The latest amendments to the standard include removal of the definition and requirements regarding "complete barrier", revision of the "Principle of Compliance" and "Product Information" sections, and integration of GB 4806.13 with GB 4806.1.

South Korea Notifies Updates to QR Code Design Requirements for Food Labeling

- On September 22, South Korea <u>notified the WTO</u> of an <u>amendment</u> (in Korean) to its *Labeling Standard for Foods*, updating the design requirements for QR codes when used on food labeling (*BCI Monitor 9-2-25*).
- As previously reported, this update includes details on what should be contained within a QR code if used on food packaging as well as display location, font size, and QR code size for various types of packaging.
- The amendment will enter into force upon its publication in the South Korean gazette.

EU, Indonesia Conclude Free Trade Agreement Negotiations

- On September 22, the European Union (EU) <u>announced</u> that it had concluded negotiations with Indonesia on a free trade agreement.
- While the exact details of the deal have not been released, it will reportedly
 remove import duties on 98.5% of tariff lines and simplify export procedures for
 both countries. The EU has published a <u>factsheet</u> on the main benefits of the
 trade deal.
- The free trade agreement must now go through both parties' national ratification process before it enters into force.
